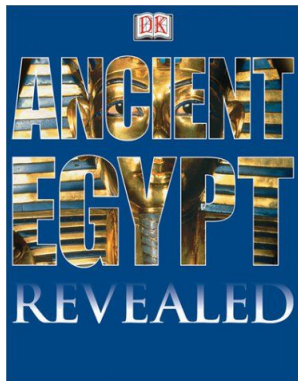

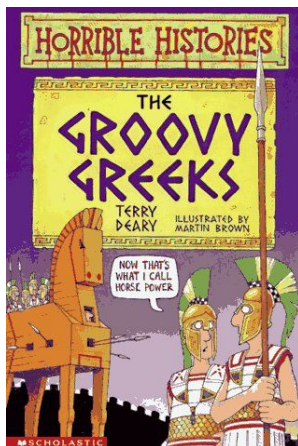
CIRCULATING BOOKS



Ancient Egypt by Peter Chrisp - 932 CHR

The combination of photos and drawings gives readers the effect of walking through an exhibit. Each spread covers different topics such as life on the Nile, tomb building, mummification, and other elements of Egyptian life. This is a wonderful source to use in the classroom or have students use this as a source to complete a group assignment.

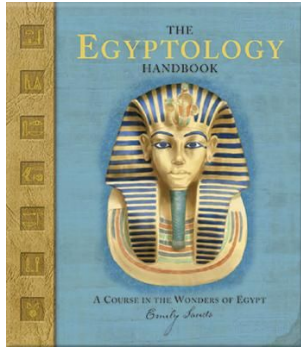

Greece: Temples, Tombs, and Treasures by Time-Life Books

VID 938 GRE

This is a great selection for the Time/ Life's Lost Civilization series, which also includes books on Egypt, Pompeii, and Mayas. This audiobook explores economy, trade, politics, and culture in the Greece civilization.

Ancient Rome by Goldhil Entertainment

VID 937 ANC

This DVD includes video footage gathered at ancient Roman ruins and shows the glory that once was Rome. The video teaches students different facts about Rome such as the history of the bathhouses, theaters, temples, and the aqueduct system.

Egypt: Secrets of the Pharaohs by National Geographic

VID 932.01 EGY

The National Geographic Society sheds light on the secrets of the pyramids, mummification, and the Egyptian Pharaohs. The video actually takes students down in the tomb of Pharaoh Khufu's tomb. Viewers can learn how the mummification process works by a group of medical archaeologists.
