

During the 1930s, farmers in the American Plains had a hard time making a living. No rain fell for many years. Without rain, their crops were ruined. Without rain, farmers couldn't plant new crops. When the winds blew, the dust was so thick that people couldn't see their hands in front of their faces. The American Plains became known as the Dust Bowl—a land of dust storms and of hard times.



Living in Kansas and Oklahoma during the Dust Bowl became almost impossible. Houses were buried in dust. It was impossible to keep anything clean. Avis D. Carlson wrote an article in the *New Republic*, "We live with the dust, eat it, sleep with it, watch it strip us of possessions and the hope of possessions."

Many families moved to California to find jobs, but work was hard to find. For many families, the promise of a better life in California brought new challenges and hardships. The hard times and worries brought on by the Dust Bowl were not left behind.


