- I served as the County Judge of Adams County for 31 years.
- Hence I was the youth court judge all those years
- Chaired Council of Youth Court Judges for 8 years
- Every day I learned something new
- The last two decades were marked by substantial scientific research which required a culture change of how we approach at risk children and families

SILLY SCHOOL SUSPENSIONS

- Clothes related
 - Color
 - Type of coat
 - Sagging
- Disrespect
- Minor altercations
- Truancy

CULTURE DRIVEN BY ZERO TOLERANCE


- Bad kids disrupts education
- Education for those who want to learn
- Suspend them so education can continue
- We owe them no duty
- We ask them "What is wrong with you"

ZERO TOLERANCE = ZERO INTELLIGENCE

- Destroys the myth that education is the great equalizer
- Allows us to avoid asking the key question
- Why are you behaving this way?
- Why are you not coming to school?
- Children living in poverty and racial minorities are overrepresented in suspended and expelled students.
- Must change the culture

ACES—ADVERSE CHILDHOOD EXPERIENCES

- Research in the late 1990's
- This population has numerous ACES usually 3 or more
- Those experiences negatively impact
 - Educational achievement
 - General behavior
 - Socialization
 - Health disorders
 - Depression
 - Addictive behaviors



CHANGE THE CULTURE

- Accept the responsibility to ensure that we do everything to educate all children, even the difficult ones.
- We change the question...
 - We asked in past "What's wrong with you?"
 - Now we ask "What happened to you?"

We must address the underlying trauma experienced by these young people and addressed early and often.

STATISTICS TELL THE STORY

Compared with children with no ACES, children with 3 or more ACES were:

Almost 3x more likely to experience academic failure,

Nearly 5x more likely to have severe attendance problems,

6x more likely to have severe school behavior problems, and

Almost 4x more likely to report frequent poor health.

CHANGE THE CULTURE

- Some Schools are properly addressing this population
 - Rather than approaching as willful behavior, they address behaviors as symptoms of exposure to ACES
- We must creatively respond with approaches that
 - Provides safety and safe place for the child at school
 - Foster connections with the child with staff and peers in school
 - Manage emotions

Schools are in unique position to be the change agent

Exciting that schools are now developing trauma informed strategies

BORROW FROM CHILD WELFARE

 Child Protection Services (CPS), in the foster care arena is required to demonstrate that they performed all reasonable efforts to prevent removal of a child from home. This is the federal standard.

 School administrators, before exercising a suspension or expulsion, ask have I done all reasonable efforts to prevent the suspension/expulsion.

• Then only those which are a public safety risk are suspended. We must find another way for all others addressing their needs.
