Let's Find Out About It:	
Preparation: Set up materials	
"In Oonga Boonga, Baby Louise's family took care of her."	Show illustrations.
"Here are images of other families taking care of their babies. What do you notice?"	Show images. Children respond.
"Families care for the babies by feeding them when they are hungry, changing their diapers when they are dirty, and soothing them when they are upset or uncomfortable."	
"Here are some things that help soothe a baby. What do you notice?"	Show rattles, blankets, and baby toys. Children respond.
"Families also keep babies safe because they cannot take care of themselves. Here are for babies. What do you notice?"	Show baby spoons, fabric blocks, etc.
"Here are for older children. What do you notice?" "Why is this safer for a baby than this?"	Show spoons, LEGOs, etc. Guide children to notice safety features such as rounded corners, non-breakable materials, and nothing a baby can swallow.

Using this as a Provocation:

Add materials to Dramatic Play. Ask families to send in photos of them taking care of babies. Use photos in Creative Writing for children to reference and caption. Encourage children to write short books about baby care ("How to Change a Baby's Diaper" or "How to Burp a Baby").
