## Storytelling:

## Discovery

(related to *Matthew and Tilly*)

#### **Homemade Lemonade:**

Here's what you will need to make it:

 4 lemons, 1 cup of sugar, 6 cups of water, pitcher

Here's what you have to do:

 Roll each lemon with the palm of your hand on a counter or tabletop. This will make the lemons easier to squeeze and help them make more juice. Cut the lemons in half.
 Squeeze them into a bowl. Add water and 1 cup of sugar. Stir everything together.

#### **Conversation Starters:**

- How do you think it is going to taste?
- Why do you think we add sugar?
- What did we do first, second, etc.?

### Literacy

#### <u>Math</u>

### Compare game:

- 1. Mix the cards
- 2. Deal cards evenly to each player.
- 3. Players flip their cards at the same time to see whose card is greater (8 is more than 5).
- 4. The player with the greater number takes the cards (if cards are equal, players flip another card to see who has more).
- 5. When all the cards are played, start again.

#### **Conversation Starters:**

- How do you know that 8 is bigger than 4?
- How can you figure out who had more?
