Language (Related to <i>Gilberto and the Wind,</i> <i>One Dark Night</i>) Storytelling: Tell your child a story about weather. Conversation starters: • What is your favorite kind of weather? • Why do you like this kind of weather? • How do you feel when it (snows, rains, sleets, is sunny)?	Literacy Poem: Recite together. This is a poem your child should be familiar with. Boom! Bang! Boom, bang, boom, bang! Rumpety, lumpety, bump! Zoom, zam, zoom, zam! Clippety, clappety, clump! Rustles and bustles, And swishes and zing; What wonderful noises A thunderstorm brings! - Anonymous		 <u>Talk and Read Together</u> (20 minutes) Conversation Starters: Look at the cover. What do you think this book will be about? What is your favorite part of the story? What is the first thing that happens in the story?
Words you can use during your conversation include <i>weather, storm,</i> <i>thunder, rain, lightning, blizzard,</i> <i>snow, wind, hurricane.</i>			 story? What do you think will happen next? Who is your favorite character?
 Discovery Sink and Float: (Related to <i>Gilberto and the Wind</i>) Materials: large empty container, coins, rocks, paper, spoon (plastic, metal, or wood), cotton ball Fill the container (or bathtub or sink) with water. Ask your child to predict which objects will sink and which will float. Make two piles. Test the objects. Conversation Starters: Do you think the (rock) will sink or float? Why do you think the (rock) will sink/float? How many objects sank? How many objects floated? Which number is bigger or smaller? Words you can use during your conversation include sink, float, heavy, light. 		 <u>Math</u> Listen and Count: Materials: tin can and bottle caps (or coins) Ask your child to close their eyes. As you drop 1-5 objects in the can, ask your child to count mentally and show you on her/his fingers how many objects drop. Spill the objects out and have your child count them. Repeat with different numbers of objects. How many did you hear? How do you know?

Tips for Reading Together:

- Sit together in a quiet, cozy spot.
- As you read, highlight and define new vocabulary. For example, "**Nibble** means to chew, taking tiny bites."
- As you read, ask your child questions pertaining to the book. For example, "What will the rabbits do if it starts to rain again?"
