<p style="text-align: center;"><u>Language</u></p> <p>Same and Different: Collect a variety of objects such as spoons, forks, small plates, cups of different sizes, plastic bottles, and pots. Look at two objects at a time and talk with your child about what she or he notices is the same and different between them.</p> <p>Conversation starters:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • What is the same or different between these two objects? • What shape are they? • What color are they? • What are they made out of? <p>Words you can use during your conversation include: <i>same, different, similar, alike, compare, contrast, sort</i></p>	<p style="text-align: center;"><u>Literacy</u></p> <p>Recite Together: This is a poem your child should be familiar with.</p> <p style="text-align: center;">Three Little Monkeys</p> <p>Three little monkeys swinging in a tree. <p style="text-align: center;"><u>Talk and Read Together</u> (20 minutes)</p> <p>Conversation Starters:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • What is your favorite part of the story? • What is the first thing that happens in the story? • What do you think will happen next? 	<p style="text-align: center;"><u>Gross Motor</u></p> <p>Green Light/Red Light Hopping: You can play this inside or outside and invite other family members. To play, one person is the traffic light, and the other players stand on the starting line. The traffic light has her back to them. When she says, "green light," the players try to hop to the finish line. When she says, "red light," she turns around and the players have to stop. This keep going until the finish line is reached by one player and then players can switch roles.</p>	<p style="text-align: center;"><u>Math</u></p> <p>Counting in Patterns: Practice counting patterns with your child by alternating between quiet and loud as you count together. For example, "1-2-3" (loud) "4-5-6" (quiet) "7-8-9" (loud) "10-11-12" (quiet), and so on.</p> <p>Conversation Starters:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • What do you notice about this pattern? • What's another pattern we could try?
