OFFICE OF ACCREDITATION

01.C. Action: Consideration of the appeals of the final accountability results under Policy 3.1.4 of the *Mississippi Public Schools Accountability Standards, 2018* [Goals 1, 2, 4, 5, and 6 – MBE Strategic Plan]

01.C. Pascagoula-Gautier School District

Background Information: On October 11, 2018 the SBE approved the 2017-2018 Mississippi Statewide Accountability results, with the exception of four (4) schools with special populations, three (3) schools within the Corinth School District and the Corinth School District. On November 8, 2018 the State Board of Education approved the final accountability results for the Corinth School District, the three (3) schools within the Corinth School District and the four (4) schools with special populations. The Office of Accreditation received appeals of the final results in accordance with Policy 3.1.4 of the Mississippi Public Schools Accountability Standards, 2018 from three (3) of the Districts.

Pascagoula-Gautier School District appealed the results for one (1) school, Pascagoula-Gautier Exceptional School.

On December 10, 2018, the Internal Review Committee met to consider the appeal from the Pascagoula-Gautier School District and voted unanimously to deny the District's appeal.

The Commission on School Accreditation (CSA) met on January 10, 2019 in a special-called meeting to consider the Internal Review Committee's decision of the appeal. In accordance with Policy 3.1.4 of the *Mississippi Public Schools Accountability Standards, 2018*, each superintendent was given an opportunity to address the CSA during this meeting. After presentations by Mr. Wayne Rodolfich, Superintendent of the Pascagoula-Gautier School District, and the MDE, the CSA voted unanimously to grant the appeal to the Pascagoula-Gautier School District.

This item references Goals 1, 2, 4, 5, and 6 of the *Mississippi Board of Education* 2018-2022 Strategic Plan.

Recommendation: Disapproval

In accordance with Miss. Code Ann. § 37-17-6, a simple "A," "B," "C," "D," and "F" designation, shall be applied to the current school and school district statewide accountability performance classifications. There is no provision in state law that provides for an exemption for special schools or special student populations. In addition to the requirements of state law, federal law and Mississippi's ESSA plan require inclusion of all schools in the accountability model. Violation of federal law could result in the loss of federal funding.

IDEA mandates that districts provide services to public education students who qualify for eligibilities per MDE guidelines. Placement decisions are not always easy, however; they are necessary to make sure that FAPE is provided and students are in an environment conducive to learning. The IEP committee, which includes parents/guardians, have the daunting task of making these decisions in the best interest of the child. To grade this school an F, a school which is designed to meet the individualized needs of a very specialized, highly involved population, sets a negative tone for students, parents, faculty, and the local community. While some parents worry about their child learning Fractions and/or Algebra 1, other parents are worried about their child touching a hot stove or being able to provide basic self-help skills for themselves. These are our most vulnerable citizens, our special pops.

The Pascagoula-Gautier School District provides FAPE to students entitled to IDEA in various settings throughout our district. Our continuum of services starts with inclusive settings, with supplemental supports and staff in place and moves through the special education continuum to the most restrictive setting. The most restrictive local setting is the Jackson County Exceptional School. In order to understand placement processes and procedures, I would like to share a brief synopsis about the JCES.

The Jackson County Board of Supervisors owns the Jackson County Exceptional School building and land. This facility/school has a \$350,000 playground designed for students with disabilities, a salt water swimming pool for water therapy, a sensory room, a grocery store, an augmentative communication library, and designated areas with changing tables and lifts to provide privacy and dignity for those who have changing needs. This school hosts many events and festivals. Our parents, families, staff, local public and private high schools, as well as businesses such as Chevron, Zachry, and Ingalls, participate as volunteers. We are building relationships within our communities, while providing educational services individualized to our communities most vulnerable children.


Three school districts share this building: Jackson County School District (JCSD), Moss Point School District (MPSD), and Pascagoula-Gautier School District (PGSD). The Jackson County Board of Supervisors has a contract that allows these districts and parents to collaborate, place, and provide services to IDEA students.




The PGSD has the privilege and honor to manage the Jackson County Exceptional School (JCES) and help provide FAPE, educational, and medical services to very involved and vulnerable students. Students range in age from 6-21, and must reside in one of the three districts in order for the JCES to be an option for placement consideration. Only students with Significant Cognitive Disabilities (SCD) are placed in this restrictive environment/separate school. One criteria for a student to be placed at the JCES is for his/her IQ to be under 60. The average IQ is approximately 50 among the 37 students. (100 is the average IQ on the bell curve. See attached)


Here are some brief facts about our setting and population. The JCES has 37 students. All districts transport to and from the facility. Currently JCES has 10 students from JCSD, 8 students from MPSD, and 19 from PGSD. In terms of eligibility categories, 19 out of 37 have an eligibility of Multiple Disabilities (MD), 10 have an Autism (AU) eligibility, and 9 are Intellectually Disabled (ID). Many student have significant medical needs that are addressed by a full-time school nurse employed at the site. For example, 46% of the school's population has Seizure Disorders, and two students have feeding tubes. It is also important to note that this site is located behind Singing River Hospital. The staff and student population are also very diverse. The school's student population includes 16 white, 16 black, and 5 Hispanic students. Our staff are trained in a variety of techniques to address the functional, social, behavioral, academic, and emotional needs of this specific population. I have included some additional charts/graphs depicting specific information/data about our school (see below).

- 1. PGSD operates the Jackson County Exceptional School ("JCES" or "Exceptional School"), which provides services to students with a wide variety of special needs ranging from developmental delays to those with severe intellectual and cognitive disabilities. JCES serves students from Moss Point School District, Jackson County School District, and the Pascagoula-Gautier School District.
- 2. On or about September 19, 2018, in response to the District becoming aware that the Exceptional School would be given a rating of "F", Superintendent Wayne Rodolfich wrote to Dr. Carey Wright informing her of the school's background and services provided. State Board Votes to Assign Grades to Corinth and Special Schools

JACKSON, Miss – The Mississippi State Board of Education (SBE) today voted to assign unofficial letter grades for the 2017-18 school year to four schools that serve students with disabilities and the Corinth School District. The schools and district had not received grades in previous years.

State and federal law mandate that all schools and districts be evaluated using a single accountability system. There are no exclusions for schools with special populations.

The federal Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA) requires that all students be included in measures of performance. The law requires those measures to be applied consistently so that schools that need improvement will be identified for support.

Accountability grades are based, in part, on how well students perform and progress from year to year on the Mississippi Academic Assessment Program (MAAP) tests for English language arts (ELA) and Mathematics. These tests are aligned to the Mississippi College and Career Ready Standards and are administered annually to students in grades 3-8 and in high school.

"State and federal laws require that all schools and districts be held to the same standard so that we have a clear picture of how well they are preparing students for the future," said Dr. Jason Dean, SBE chair.

SUPPLEMENTAL EVIDENCE IN SUPPORT OF APPEAL

The Pascagoula-Gautier School District ("PGSD"), has appealed pursuant to the Mississippi Public School Accountability Standards regarding the "F" rating assigned to the Jackson County Exceptional School ("JCES"). The following is submitted in supplement of the appeal pursuant to 3.1.4 of the Mississippi Public School Accountability Standards 2018.

PGSD respectfully requests that the JCES not receive a grade or School Performance Classification. As noted in the Commission on School Accreditation Minutes of September 18, 2018:

XI. Discussion: District/School Performance Reports and District/School Performance Classification for School Year 2017-2018.

Alan Burrow presented the results of the 2017-2018 Mississippi State-Wide Accountability System for schools and districts.

Discussion: Roy Gill ask for clarity on how schools with "0" in some of their components were graded and expressed concerns about schools whose purpose is to serve students with exceptional needs being rated an "F". Mr. Burrow explained that all schools are required to get a grade by the State for performance pay for teachers and that ESSA doesn't allow for exceptions for sub-groups such as students with significant cognitive disabilities (SCD).

Eddie Prather agrees that it is problematic to assign special schools an "F". Roy Gill stated that he would like to see the grades of these schools suppressed before they go to press and is concerned that "unofficial" doesn't mean much to the media.

Michael Lindsey and Anthony Montgomery asked if these schools could be given a "NG" or an "N/A" this year until we could find out another way to report them. Dr. Oakley explained that ESSA requires they received a grade, but that it may be a topic for the Accountability Task Force to consider.

Anthony Montgomery stated that he believes we need an accountability model for special schools such as MSB/MSD.

See September 18, 2018 Minutes of Commission on School Accreditation attached as Exhibit "A".

As noted in the Minutes attached as Exhibit "A", Commissioners had concerns about grading schools who serve students with exceptional needs. PGSD agrees with Mr. Montgomery's comments that there needs to be an accountability model for special schools such as the Mississippi School for the Blind, Mississippi School for the Deaf, and JCES. Similar comments have been expressed at the Federal level.

A few commenters asserted that it was inappropriate to assess students with the most significant cognitive disabilities, even using an AA-AAAS and appropriate accommodations, believing these assessments are outside such students' range of ability.

Volume 81, Federal Register No. 236, December 8, 2016.

In the State of Texas, the Austin Independent School District operates the Rosedale School, which is similar to JCES in serving children with severe special needs. Following the F-rating assigned to the Rosedale School, the Austin Independent School District filed an appeal to the Texas Education Agency. See letter of September 13, 2018 from AISD, Office of Superintendent. In that letter, the AISD Superintendent expressed the following:

A label of Not Rated has been assigned to Rosedale School in 21 of the past 24 years. Since 2011, year to year changes to the components of the state accountability system and the Assessment Design for students with the most severe cognitive disabilities have resulted in uncertainty and unnecessary stress for the Rosedale School community regarding state ratings. We recognize the appeal process as the mechanism to address these unique issues, but wish to point out that the three-month period between the public release of a preliminary rating of improvement required and the outcome of an appeal is demoralizing for Rosedale families and staff and detracts from the real work of this school.

Please consider our request to assign a label of Not Rated to Rosedale School, now and in the future.

See letter of September 13, 2018 of AISD attached as Exhibit "B".

Similarly, PGSD requests that the Commission on School Accreditation and State Board of Education assign a Not Rated label to JCES due to its unique circumstances and the special population it serves.

Florida law allows for exemption from state-wide, standardized assessments involving certain students with disabilities. FSA Section 1008.212 states that:

A student with a disability for whom the Individual Education Plan (IEP) Team determines is prevented by circumstance or condition from physically demonstrating the mastery of skills that have been acquired and/or measured by the state-wide standardized assessment, a state-wide standardized end of course assessment, or an alternate assessment pursuant to S.1008.22(3)(c) shall be granted an extraordinary exemption from the administration of the assessment.

Also, FSA Section 1008.22 allows for a permanent exemption approved by the Florida Commissioner of Education for those children meeting the definition of a child with medical complexity or a child who, based upon medical documentation from a physician licensed under Chapter 458 or Chapter 459 is medically fragile and needs intensive care due to a condition such as a congenital or acquired multi-system disease; has a severe neurological or cognitive disorder with marked functional impairment; or is technology dependent for activities of daily living; and lacks the capacity to take or perform on an assessment. FSA Section 1008.22(11). See also *Drew v. Florida Department of Education*, 202 So 3d 951 (D.C.A. Fla 2016). (Florida Department agreed to grant permanent exemption to parent's daughter based on her medical complexity.)

Even though Federal and State law contain provisions for the assessment of children with severe disabilities, PGSD requests that the Commission on School Accreditation not assign an F-rating to the JCES. Alternatively, PGSD requests that the Commission and/or State Board of Education remove the F label until such time as administrative or legislative changes can be made to correct the inherent unfairness of assessing children with severe cognitive disabilities in the

same manner as other students. As has been shown in sister states of Texas and Florida, flexibility in assigning a performance rating to exceptional schools and their individual students may be considered. Accordingly, PGSD requests that the Commission on School Accreditation and the Mississippi State Board of Education enter a decision or ruling removing the F grading from the JCES.

PGSD Superintendent Wayne Rodolfich may present additional argument and a power point presentation before the Commission on School Accreditation at such time as scheduled by the Commission.

Ms. Westerfield called the meeting to order at 10:02 a.m.



Dr. Malone presented the recommended accreditation statuses for the 2018-2019 School Year.

Discussion: Roy Gill expressed some concern regarding the number of districts in violation of Process Standard 2 (Personnel) and how districts are struggling to find qualified staff to meet the requirements. Erin Meyer explained that the Commission on Teacher and Administrator Education, Certification and Licensure and Development (Licensure Commission) is aware of the impact of the shortage of teachers across the state and is working to address the issue.

IX. Action: Approval of District Accreditation Statuses for 2018-2019

On a motion by John Mistilis seconded by Roy Gill, the Commission unanimously approved the approval of the recommended District Accreditation Statuses for 2018-2019.

X. Information: Report of the Internal Review of Preliminary Accountability Results in accordance with Accreditation Policy 3.1.3 of the Mississippi Public School Accountability Standards, 2018

Alan Burrow provided an overview of the results of the decisions of the Internal Review Committee's review of appeals of the preliminary accountability results. There were no changes that resulted from the decisions of the Internal Review Committee.

XI. Discussion: District/School Performance Reports and District/School Performance Classifications for School Year 2017-2018

Alan Burrow presented the results of the 2017-2018 Mississippi Statewide Accountability System for schools and districts.

Discussion: Roy Gill asked for clarity on how schools with "0" in some of their components were graded and expressed concerns about schools whose purpose is to serve students with exceptional needs being rated an "F". Mr. Burrow explained that all schools are required to get a grade by the state for performance pay for teachers and that ESSA doesn't allow for exceptions for subgroups such as students with significant cognitive disabilities (SCD).

Eddie Prather agrees that it is problematic to assign special schools an "F". Roy Gill stated that he would like to see the grades of these schools suppressed before they go to press and is concerned that "unofficial" doesn't mean much to the media.

Michael Lindsey and Anthony Montgomery asked if these schools could be given a "NG" or an "N/A" this year until we can find out another way to report them. Dr. Oakley explained that ESSA requires they received a grade but that it may be a topic for the Accountability Task Force to consider.

Anthony Montgomery stated that he believes we need an accountability model for special schools such as MSB/MSD.

Sean Brewer expressed a concern about the EL component stating that none of the schools increased with the inclusion of the EL component. Therefore, he is concerned that it will be a negative impact going forward. He also asked if this component is concrete or if it is still up for discussion. Mr. Burrow explained that the EL component is still up for review but that the agency hopes to avoid resubmitting the ESSA plan.

Ms. Westerfield asked the EL component required. Dr. Oakley responded that it is, but there is some flexibility on how MDE implements it in the model.

XII. Action: Approval of District/School Performance Classifications for School Year 2018-2019 (based on School Year 2017-2018), with the Stipulation that the Information Continue to be Embargoed to the Public until September 20, 2018

On a motion by Sean Brewer seconded by Brian Harvey, the Commission voted to approve the District/School Performance Classifications for School Year 2018-2019 (based on School Year

2017-2018), with the stipulation that the information continue to be embargoed to the public until September 20, 2018.

Rosedale School [227901251] is a specialty school in the Austin Independent School District [227901] located at 2117 W 49th Street in Austin, Texas. Rosedale offers a caring, family-focused community that supports the unique learning requirements of children with severe special needs. Through Rosedale's tailored educational opportunities and quality instruction, students increase their independence, improve their self-esteem and experience a greater quality of life.

Through the GO Project, a community-based transition program to move students from the high-school setting to a college or work environment, Rosedale also supports special education students who are 18 to 21 years old and have completed their graduation requirements at their home school. All Rosedale students graduate under the provisions of an Individualized Graduation Program (IEP).

This is an appeal of the 2018 preliminary rating of Improvement Required assigned to Rosedale School. There is ample evidence to establish that 33% of Rosedale annual graduates met the CCMR requirements of the 2018 state accountability system and that Rosedale would qualify for a 2018 rating of Met Standard. That evidence will be presented in the following documents. However, because of the unique circumstances of this school, we ask that the Commissioner assign a label of Not Rated to Rosedale School, for 2018 and in future years.

STAAR performance is a major component of accountability ratings, but at Rosedale STAAR results are not reflective of the work of the school. None of the Rosedale students take the regular STAAR; all qualify for the STAAR Alt2, the test designed for special education students with significant cognitive disabilities. In 2017-18, of the 27 students enrolled in tested grade levels, 20 students could not take the assessments because they were unable to provide an authentic academic response. STAAR Alt2 assessments for these students are identified with a score code of No Authentic Academic Response (NAAR). As a result, the STAAR component of the Student Achievement Domain was based on 17 STAAR Alt2 tests taken by just seven students. Likewise, the Student Progress Academic Growth score was based on ten tests taken by just six students.

The pattern was similar in the two previous years. 21 of 34 students exhibited No Authentic Academic Response (NAAR) in 2016-17, and 17 of 34 students in 2015-16. For your reference, the eligibility criteria for a NAAR designation is shown below. To qualify as NAAR, an ARD committee must answer yes to at least one of the eligibility questions:
