Professional Development

- MDE provides regional, on-demand professional development to educators in a range of content areas.
- MDE transitioned face-to-face professional development content into a virtual, on-demand setting to effectively serve teachers remotely during COVID-19.
- In 2020-2021, MDE delivered 467 professional development sessions to 11,462 educators statewide through the professional development coordinator model and RESA-facilitated system.
- During the 2020-2021 school year, 2,988 teachers participated virtually in 57 canvas courses.



Early Learning Collaboratives

National Institute for Early Education Research (NIEER) Named Mississippi One of Only Six States Meeting All Quality Standards for Pre-K


- Mississippi's Early Learning Collaboratives (ELC) meet all 10 of NIEER's quality standards.
- NIEER tracks state-funded preschool access, resources and quality.
- ELC students start kindergarten more prepared than students in Mississippi's other public pre-K programs.





Early Learning Collaborative Achievement

- ELC students show higher rates of kindergarten readiness (77%) than students in other public pre-K classes (69%).
- Kindergarten readiness among ELC students increased annually, rising from 59% in 2015 to 77% in 2019.
- Due to COVID-19, ELC students were assessed for the 2020-2021 school year, but the results were only used to inform instruction.

Early Learning Collaboratives


- In 2020-2021, coaches supported teachers by providing activities to help students learning virtually and by coaching teachers in face-to-face classrooms. Interactions also focused on social-emotional needs for students, teachers, and administrators.
- In 2021-2022, the Office of Early Childhood is offering a hybrid model of coaching to be able to effectively coach and support state and other funded Pre-K classrooms throughout the state.



Kindergarten Readiness Assessment

- For three years in a row, the Kindergarten Readiness Assessment showed the majority of kindergarteners made significant gains during the academic year.
- Average scores and percent meeting end-of-year target score increased annually from 2015 to 2019.
- Spring 2019, 65.6% of kindergarteners met or exceeded end-of-year transitional reader score.
- Children were assessed in 2020-2021 school year, but the results were only used to inform instruction.


KINDERGARTEN **READINESS AND GROWTH**




3rd Grade Reading Achievement

Mississippi Academic Assessment Program (MAAP)

Overall Results

- Overall proficiency for Mathematics and English Language Arts (ELA) in 2021 decreased from 2019.
- In Grade 8 ELA, the proficiency rate in 2021 increased by 0.1% (35.6%) as compared to 35.5% in 2019.
- Prior to the COVID-19 pandemic, statewide results showed gains in Mathematics and ELA for four years in a row (2015-16, 2016-17, 2017-18 and 2018-19).
- In 2021, 31 districts had greater than 45.0% of all students scoring at Level 4
 or higher in Mathematics compared to 60 districts in 2019.
- In 2021, 20 districts had greater than 45.0% of all students scoring at Level 4
 or higher in ELA compared to 48 districts in 2019.
- For 2021, the overall participation rate for Mathematics, ELA, Science, and U.S. History was 96.9%.




All Students

- Total Mississippi students taking AP courses and passing AP exams nearly doubled from 2013 to 2019.
- AP exam pass rate for students in all grades increased to an all-time high of 44% in 2020.
- COVID affected the number of exams taken in 2020, dropping from all-time high of 13,806 in 2019 to 10,175.


Class of 2020

- 38.2% earned qualifying scores, an increase from 32.5% for the previous year's graduates.
- 20.7% of Mississippi's public-school class of 2020 took 11,526 AP exams during high school, a decrease (-2%) from the class of 2019.













- Expansion of Early Childhood Education Programs \$26.3M (Goal 3)
 - The proposed budget reflects an increase in general funds of \$10.3M over the FY22 funding level.
 - The proposed budget would allow for an additional 3,914 students to have access to high quality early childhood programs.
 - 95% of funds are granted to local entities to operate programs, and remaining funds are used for professional development and support.
 - ELCs continue to achieve higher rates of kindergarten readiness among students than other public pre-K programs.



- Expansion of Professional Development Programming \$613K
 (Goals 1, 2, 3, 4, 6)
 - Budget reflects an increase of \$222K over the FY22 funding level.
 - Funds will be used to continue development and delivery of online and face-to-face professional development by fully funding existing professional development coordinator positions.
 - Teachers will deepen knowledge of Mississippi-College and Career-Readiness Standards (MSCCRS).
 - Additional focus will be placed on the adoption of high-quality instructional materials and aligned professional development to ensure greater student achievement for all students.
 - During SY2019-20, professional development coordinator offerings reached 11,143 teachers, counselors, administrators, and district staff.
 - Through May of SY2020-21, professional development coordinator offerings have reached 40,470, with more trainings scheduled for June.



2022 Legislative Priorities

- Secondary Education: Middle/High School Innovation & Redesign \$750K (Goals 1, 2, 4, 6)
 - Requested increase of \$388K will support districts of innovation implementation, counseling services, and curriculum development.
- Secondary Education \$5.8M (Goals 1, 2, 4, 6)
 - Increase of \$5.3M includes funding for expanded professional development including continued mathematics coaching support.
- Mississippi Community Oriented Policing Services (MCOPS) \$3M
 - The proposed budget reflects an increase in general funds of \$1M over the FY22 funding level.
 - Grants were awarded for 186 School Resource Officers (SROs) to serve 306 schools in FY21 at \$10K each, with matching local funds on a 50/50 basis.
 - Additional funding will allow the MDE to grant awards to an additional 100 SROs in FY23 to serve schools within the local school districts.



2022 Legislative Priorities

Office of Test Security – \$642K (Goal 1)

- The proposed budget reflects an increase in general funds of \$285K over the FY22 funding level.
- The increase in funding requested is to establish the Office of Test Security and provide three (3) additional PINS (including salary, fringe and benefits, and travel expenses) to investigate allegations of test irregularities/cheating in accordance with Miss. Code Ann. § 37-16-4.

Accreditation Review Teams – \$400K (Goals 1,2, 3, 4, 5, 6)

- The proposed budget reflects an increase in general funds of \$331K
 over the FY22 funding level.
- One (1) on-site full investigative audit was conducted in FY21.
- The increased funding will provide the Office of Accreditation the additional capacity needed to conduct approximately 25 on-site reviews of compliance with accreditation standards and accountability requirements in FY23 in accordance with Miss. Code Ann. § 37-17-6.



- Full Funding of MAEP \$2.7B Preliminary (Goals 1, 2, 3, 4, 6)
 - Preliminary estimate for full funding of the Mississippi Adequate Education Program calculated by MDE staff and verified by an independent certified accounting firm as required by Statute.




