CONCEPT WORDS These words are basic words that relate to the theme and concept for each week. These words help with discussing the question of the week.

branch	A part of the tree that grows out from the trunk
color	The shade of paint or a crayon
hot	Very warm; not cold
jungle	Land covered with thick bushes, vines, and many trees
leaf	A thin, flat green shape growing from the stem of a plant or branch
trunk	The main stem of a tree

AMAZING WORDS These words increase and improve children’s vocabularies and understanding of the text and world around them.


explore	To find out about a place

Ideas for At Home Activities:

Pretend & Learn	Play “Simon Says,” but instead call it “Lion Says.” Ask your child to imitate different animals from the jungle. For example, “Lion says, Move like a sloth.” Switch roles and let your child lead the game and you follow. This game will help your child develop listening skills, skills in following directions, and strengthen large muscles.
ABC	Use alphabet flashcards or make your own with index cards or small pieces of paper. Ask your child to think of different animals in the jungle that may start with the sounds of the letters you hold up (M=Monkey, S= Snake, T=Tiger). Let your child hold up letter cards for you to name jungle animals, too. Play this at home, in the car, or waiting at the doctor’s office. This activity will help your child with letter recognition and letter sounds.
Writing	Ask your child to write each letter of his/her name on separate sticky notes or on small pieces of paper. Mix up the letters and ask your child to place them in order to make his/her name. If your child is ready, he or she can write their name.

Math	Ask your child to help you set the table and count the number of plates, cups, forks, spoons, napkins, etc. that are placed on the table. Next, help your child identify patterns you have created using items (Example: napkin, fork, plate, spoon; napkin, fork, plate, spoon). You can also have a conversation about where to place items using spatial words such as beside, above, behind, under, or below (“The napkin goes UNDER the fork”).
Science/Social Studies	Go outside with your child and talk about the weather. Is it sunny? Cloudy? Raining? Cold? Hot? Then, look around at the trees and plants. Explain to your child that different trees and plants grow in different places around the world. The weather plays a role in where some plants and trees can grow.
Art	<p>Make a jungle picture web. Write the word JUNGLE in the middle of a piece of paper and draw 5 – 8 lines coming from the word. Then, using crayons or markers, you and your child can draw pictures of jungle animals by each line.</p> 
Sensory	On a clean, flat surface or on a baking sheet, have your child write their name, letters, numbers, or draw pictures using shaving cream, cornmeal, or salt. Show your child how to “erase” using a hand to smooth the surface.
Building	Reread and listen to the book, <i>Amazing Jungle</i> https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=congckBNVZQ Your child can use boxes, Legos, blocks, or playdough to build a canopy , understory , and forest floor from the book. Later, your child can add cut-out or drawn pictures of the different animals that live in each part of the jungle.
Social-Emotional Activity	Ask your child to tell you about their day (at home or at school). Ask your child to express his or her feelings about the events of the day through writing, drawing, singing, or dancing. Encouraging your child to express his or her feelings and thoughts helps your child build self-confidence, independence, and creativity.
