04. Information: Report on Oral Proceedings regarding Miss. Admin. Code 7-3: 100.1, State Board Policy, Chapter 100, Rule 100.1, "Compliance with State Law Regarding Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion Prohibitions, Complaint Process, and Investigations [Goals 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, and 6 – MBE Strategic Plan]

**Background Information**: During the 2025 Legislative Session, the legislature passed House Bill 1193, which became effective upon passage, April 17, 2025.

House Bill 1193 is an act to prohibit public schools and public postsecondary educational institutions from taking certain actions and engaging in discrimination practices, specifically related to diversity, equity, and inclusion ("DEI"). It seeks to ensure that employment, academic opportunities, and student engagement are based solely on individual merit, qualifications and academic performance, without consideration of an individual's race, sex, color, national origin, or expressed opposition to, or refusal to affirm or participate in diversity, equity, and inclusion.

The law requires that within 90 days of passage, the State Board of Education shall adopt a model complaint process, investigative procedures and all other policies and procedures for appropriately investigating violations under House Bill 1193.


The State Board of Education approved the MDE's request to begin to the APA process to establish Miss. Admin. Code 7-3: 100.1, State Board Policy, Chapter 100, Rule 100.1, "Compliance with State Law Regarding Diversity Equity and Inclusion Prohibitions, Complaint Process, and Investigations," on May 15, 2025.


In accordance with Miss. Code Ann. § 25-43-4.104, the MDE received the requisite number of written requests for an oral proceeding on the proposed rule adoption and scheduled a public hearing on the proposed rule. This hearing took place on Wednesday, June 11, 2025, in the 4<sup>th</sup> Floor Boardroom at Central High School. A record, including any documents submitted at the proceeding, was made, and the designated hearing officer is here to provide a summary and any recommendation.

This item references Goals 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, and 6 of the *Mississippi Board of Education Strategic Plan*.

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MS. MEYER: Good morning. My name is Erin Meyer. I serve as general counsel to the Mississippi Department of Education. I am also here with Mr. Mike Kent who is the designated representative who will be facilitating this public comment hearing.

We're here because, during the 2025 regular 6 7 legislative session, the Legislature passed House Bill 1193, which is an act to prohibit public schools and 8 public post-secondary educational institutions from taking 9 10 certain actions and engaging in discriminatory practices specifically related to diversity, equity, and inclusion. 11 12 It seeks to ensure that employment, academic 13 opportunities, and student engagement are based solely on individual merit, gualifications, and academic 14 15 performance without consideration of an individual's race, sex, color, national origin, or expressed opposition to or 16 17 refusal to affirm or participate in diversity, equity, and inclusion. 18

19 This law requires that, within 90 days of 20 passage, the State Board of Education shall adopt a model 21 complaint process, investigative procedures, and other 22 policies and procedures for appropriately investigating 23 violations under House Bill 1193 in the local school 24 districts.

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On May 15th, the State Board of Education took

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action to begin the APA process to receive public comments on the proposed policy. That public comment period closed yesterday at 5 p.m. Please note that this House bill does not authorize the State Board of Education in its policy to clarify or interpret the definitions, prohibitions, or exceptions that were enumerated in the House bill.

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7 In accordance with the Administrative Procedures 8 Act, the rules and regulations of the Secretary of State, and the State Board of Education, today we're here for a 9 public comment hearing being held to receive oral feedback 10 11 on the proposed policy, and that is Mississippi Administrative Code 7-3: 100.1, State Board Policy, 12 Chapter 100, Rule 100.1, Compliance with State Law 13 Regarding Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion Prohibitions, 14 15 Complaint Process, and Investigations.

16 As we previously stated, everyone that's here in attendance will be asked to sign in as they enter. 17 This 18 hearing is open to the public, but it is not being live streamed. If there are more people, there is overfill in 19 20 the auditorium downstairs. A transcript of the proceedings is being recorded. We have an American Sign 21 Language interpreter present, as well. Only the 22 23 individuals who registered timely will be allowed to speak today. Each person will be allotted three minutes to 24 25 comment. Speakers that are here may also submit written

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comments or other documentation to be included in the record of the hearing, but we need that today. And like I said, all other written comments had to have been received last night by 5 p.m., based on the APA comment period.

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5 Mr. Kent will call speakers to the microphone 6 alphabetically by their last name and, in addition to 7 Mr. Kent, we have a time keeper who will assist speakers 8 in keeping track of their time. You can see you'll be 9 given three minutes. At one minute, the timekeeper will 10 raise her hand just so you're aware, and then there will 11 be a beep at the end of your allotted time.

As this hearing is being held to receive oral 12 13 feedback on the proposed policy, there will be no question-and-answer period and no discussion. 14 When the speaker is called, we are asking that, before you begin 15 your comments, you state your name, any organization 16 17 you're affiliated with, and then state the sections of the 18 policy that your comments will address. 19 Mr. Kent, the floor is yours. 20 MR. KENT: Thank you, Ms. Meyer, and good morning, everybody. Let's take a deep breath and smile, 21 and we'll be off to a good start here in a few minutes. 22 Ladies, would y'all interpret my comments 23 24 regarding hearing impaired? 25 Do we have anyone who is hearing impaired?

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1 (No response.) MR. KENT: Okay. All right. Then help us -- if 2 3 you have any issues as it relates to that, then give us a 4 high sign or something and one of the interpreters will pick up and begin doing that. Otherwise, we probably will 5 6 not try to interpret every -- every word. 7 Okay. Just a couple of comments here. We will produce a transcript of these proceedings. Ms. Cathy 8 9 White is the court reporter. She is strategically located right next to the speakers so that she can capture their 10 11 comments as accurately as possible. 12 Again, my name is Mike Kent. I'm a retired 13 school superintendent here as a contract worker to 14 moderate this hearing. My job is to create a transcript 15 that is the formal record of the proceedings. As the 16 moderator, I have no position on the matter and I am not a 17 decision-maker as it relates to the policy. 18 We will, as Ms. Meyer said, we'll call speakers 19 alphabetically. If someone happens to be late, we will 20 just move them to the end of the list, but we'll try to 21 capture everybody as long as they arrive before we get 22 finished. 23 Speakers, when I call you up, I'll just prompt you and ask you to state your name for the record and I'll 24 25 say that you're on the clock and, at that point, the

Make yourself 10 comfortable. State your name for the record and you are 11 on the clock. 12 MS. HOUSTON: All right. Good morning. My name 13 is Riley Houston. I was born here in Jackson, 14 Mississippi, and I've lived in the state my entire life. 15 I'm currently studying for my master's degree in history 16 at the University of Southern Mississippi, focusing on southern social history, and I wanted to come speak today 17 on why I think that this bill is wrong. 18 It goes without saying, but will be repeated 19 here, that to limit in any way the teaching of concepts 20 21 surrounding race because they are too divisive is deeply appropriate anywhere, but especially so in Mississippi. 22 23 This is the state of divisive figures such as Medgar Evers, Vernon Dahmer, Fannie Lou Hamer, James Meredith, 24 the Freedom Summer Riders, and many more. Representatives 25

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1 Bryant Clark and Jeffrey Harness, as well as Senator John 2 Horhn, have spoken powerfully on this topic already. Due to lack of time, I'm going to focus 3 4 specifically on the part of the bill that legislates 5 against educational topics surrounding LGBT issues, as I 6 have personal experience. 7 I have taken the queer history class in 8 Mississippi. Among the history classes offered, it was 9 one of the most popular with one of the highest enrollments in the History Department. Students who had 10 to drop the class due to time commitments continued to 11 12 discuss the reading material with their friends who 13 remained. We had documentary and film viewings every 14 Wednesday night and students would often bring friends who were not even enrolled in the class, but were just 15 curious. These were college students voluntarily setting 16 aside a weeknight to watch a documentary for absolutely no 17 18 class credit. The students in this class were engaged, attentive and went above and beyond to learn more. 19 20 Suffice to say, I think that the college students of Mississippi can handle divisive concepts and discussions 21 of gender theory and transgender ideology, terms that 22 appear in this bill. 23 At the end of the semester, one girl told our 24 25 professor that she was grateful for the class. She

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herself didn't identify as LGBT, but she planned to teach high school and knew that she would have students that did. She felt like, after this class, she understood their perspectives better.

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Speaking as someone who studies social history, 5 6 teaching about the histories of marginalized socialized 7 groups show that their lives mattered and that their 8 actions had a meaningful effect on history. When you 9 exclude diverse perspectives and stories from the teaching 10 of history, you send the message that these social groups 11 do not matter and the people they represent did not do 12 anything of real value. By extension, the people in 13 modern day who identify with those groups feel less like they matter. Beyond that, open conversations regarding 14 15 diverse viewpoints is necessary in a democracy and it 16 helps prepare students for the real world where they will 17 encounter a diverse range of people.

18 Mississippi is already a diverse state. If this bill remains, a diverse range of students will not 19 20 disappear, but will simply feel like people wish that they 21 would. Erasing the history of different groups in this 22 state does not make them go away. I would like to state plainly that Mississippians of all types belong here and 23 that they deserve to have that reflected in their schools. 24 25 Thank you very much.

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
