





An Exploration of the Grand Canyon




In 1869, Powell and a small crew of men gathered in Green River Station in the Wyoming Territory to begin their three-month expedition. They set out on their trip rowing wooden

boats filled with food, supplies, and equipment. They worked together to set up camp, prepare food, and row the boats. They helped each other meet new challenges each day.



Powell kept a journal in which he wrote down dates and descriptions of the river and the canyon. He climbed the

walls of the canyon, which grew higher and higher. He measured the height of the canyon walls. Some sections of the river were calm and some had dangerous rapids. At times, the rapids were so big that they lost supplies,



and they had to carry their boats across the land. But in the end, Powell and his men met the challenges they faced. Their courage helped them to survive. After Powell returned home, he gave speeches wherever he went about his exploration of the Grand Canyon.

They got cold when the river splashed into the boat.




A Great Adventure




Jack also learned about John Wesley Powell—an early explorer in the




Uncle Don drives the school bus Jack rides.




